Always hesitant about publishing his work, Kolatkar waited until 2004, when he knew he was dying from cancer, before bringing out two further books, *Kala Ghoda Poems* and *Sarpa Satra*. A posthumous selection, *The Boatride and Other Poems* (2008), edited by Arvind Krishna Mehrotra, contained his previous uncollected English poems as well as translations of his Marathi poems; among the book's surprises were his translations of bhakti poetry, song lyrics, and a long love poem, the only one he wrote, cleverly disguised as light verse. This first *Collected Poems in English* brings together work from all those volumes. *Jejuri* offers a rich description of India while at the same time performing a complex act of devotion, discovering the divine trace in a degenerate world.
